

DEVELOPMENT ECONOMICS AND POLICY MINOR

The minor will provide an overview of the core issues in international and U.S. economic development. Special focus is given to practical analysis and real-world problems.

Requirements

Students wishing to minor in Development Economics and Policy must take a total of at least 15 credits from the courses listed below. At least nine credits must be taken from the Core Courses and at most six credits must be taken from the Elective Courses.
